Other Secular Celebrations This Holiday Season

When you think of winter holidays, Christmas is most likely to be the first one that comes to mind. Celebrated around the world, Christmas is considered both a religious holiday, honoring the birth of Jesus, and a cultural one, with a history and tradition that combines Christian beliefs with ancient folklore and rituals.

In 1870, Christmas was declared a federal holiday and is now one of the most popular holidays in the United States, as well as being widely celebrated in other countries.

However, Christmas isn't the only holiday celebrated during the winter season. There are a plethora of other holidays that are culturally significant to their countries of origin, some of which have festivities that far exceed even the most ostentatious Christmas celebration. Here is just a sampling of other winter holidays celebrated all over the world.

Diwali

Otherwise known as the Festival of Lights, Diwali is a holiday of Hindu origin and is widely celebrated throughout India. The five-day event takes place on the 15th day of the month of Kartik in the Hindu calendar, which falls in October or November. Celebrants light clay lamps, said to represent the destruction of anything negative in one's life, and celebrate the goddess Lakshmi, who is purported to bring wealth and good fortune.

Kwanzaa

Kwanzaa, which is observed from December 26 to January 1, is a holiday that celebrates African culture and community. With activities focused around what is called the Nguzo Saba (The Seven Principles) celebrating traits such as collective work, creativity, and purpose, communities join together with feasts, music, dance, and a continued commitment to cultural values.

Hanukkah

The Jewish festival of Hanukkah is an eight-night celebration that commemorates the rededication of the Second Temple in Jerusalem during the Maccabean Revolt. It begins on the 25th of Kislev on the Hebrew calendar, which usually occurs in November or

December. Celebrations include meals with traditional foods, the lighting of the menorah, and eight nights of games and gifts.

Las Posadas

Las Posadas, a Mexican holiday that takes place between December 16 and December 24, honors the journey of Joseph and Mary as they made their way from Nazareth to Bethlehem. The festival includes a small child dressed as an angel, leading a procession of children through town as they go to various homes, seeking lodging for Joseph and Mary. Each stop includes songs and scripture readings and ends with a Mass service and the children breaking open piñatas full of candy and toys.

St. Nicholas Day

Celebrating the Christian saint who sold everything he owned to give money to the poor, St. Nicholas Day, also known as the Feast of St. Nicholas, is observed on December 6 and is celebrated throughout much of northern Europe. Traditions include leaving small gifts and treats in shoes. While still considered a different entity than our modern-day Santa Claus, many of the traditions of Santa originated with the legends of St. Nicholas.

Omisoka

Omisoka is the Japanese New Year, and like the western version of New Year's is celebrated on December 31. It is considered one of the most important holidays in Japanese culture, second only to January 1, known as Shogatsu or Japanese New Year's Day. Celebrating the close of the old year and ushering in the new one, Japanese people host Bonenkai parties, intended to help forget about the past year, write cards to friends and family, and send gifts. Many families make rice cakes as part of the celebration, and homes are decorated with a sacred Shinto straw rope.

Boxing Day

Celebrated primarily in the U.K. and other European countries, Boxing Day takes place on December 26. Traditionally a day off for servants and the day when their employers would give them a "Christmas box" or monetary gift, modern Boxing Day customs include sporting events such as full programs of top-tier international football leagues, shopping, and a holiday from work. Are Cats Smarter Than Dogs? Here's What Science Says

Ever since humans split into cat people and dog people, the world has never been the same. And we might go to war someday because we can't agree on what animal is smarter.

Cat people point to feline independence and self-reliance as the most compelling sign that they are more intelligent than dogs. Unlike dogs, cats can hunt for themselves without being bred for it or being trained to.

What's more, you do not need to potty-train a cat as you have to with a dog. Moreover, a cat can keep itself clean while a dog needs your help.

On the other hand, dog people point to canines' trainability as being the most telling sign of intelligence. Dogs can learn complex tasks such as working as service dogs and cracking cases with the police, making them invaluable to us. Team dog also posits that cats are not aloof; they are simply unable to learn complex tasks.

As you can imagine, neither group is willing to budge from their stance. Fortunately, we can rely on good old science to shed some light on this topic.

Measuring Intelligence

According to a study published in the *Frontiers Journal*, one of the best ways of measuring cognitive ability in animals is by counting the number of neurons they possess.

Neurons are the units responsible for information processing in the brain. They gather information from all over the body for the cerebral cortex to process. Different brain sections specialize in processing a specific type of information. The cerebral cortex acts as the coordinating unit to facilitate functions such as decision-making and problem-solving.

According to Suzanaerculano-Houzel, a neuroscientist involved in this study, counting the number of neurons in an animal's cerebral cortex is one of the most accurate tools to judge an animal's capacity for complex thought, despite its difficulty.

So, which pet reigns supreme?

The study found that the dog has 530 million neurons in its cerebral cortex compared to the cat's 250 million neurons. This means that dogs have twice as many neurons in their cerebral cortices as cats.

Does this finding imply that dogs are more intelligent than cats?

Dissecting the Study

If you are a cat person, chances are you are not happy with the turn of events. After all, dogs are larger than cats, meaning they should have larger brains and more neurons.

However, it is not that straightforward.

In addition to cats and dogs, the study also examined several other animals' brains, which included an African lion, a brown bear, a striped hyena, a banded mongoose, a domestic ferret, and a banded raccoon.

The findings were nothing short of fascinating. For starters, the brown bear has almost the same neuron count as the cat despite its brain being about 10 times larger than that of the cat. This implies that there is no correlation between brain size and neuron count, with findings from the raccoon's brain acting as evidence of this hypothesis.

A raccoon's brain is roughly the same size as that of a cat. However, this masked bandit has about the same number of neurons as a dog. This means that an animal does not need to have a larger brain to have more neurons.

If that were the case, humans would need a whale-sized head to house all of the 16 billion neurons we have in our cerebral cortices.

Counter Arguments

According to Jessica Hekman, a veterinary geneticist at MIT, one should be cautious when interpreting results from this study. For starters, she said, there is no established link between intelligence and neuron number.

Therefore, the measure of intelligence should be determined by an animal's ability to solve its niche problems. For example, while both dolphins and chimpanzees are considered geniuses in their habitats, either animal would look silly in the other's habitat.

Similarly, cats and dogs excel in different areas. As such, comparing a cat's intelligence with that of a dog's is akin to comparing a screwdriver with a hammer.

Conclusion

While findings from the study suggest that dogs might be smarter than cats, the study has many flaws. It does not consider that cats and dogs are intelligent in different ways. For example, the average dog is not as adept at hunting as the average cat.
